



Where Success Takes Root

From pre-med student to published author and public health advocate, one alumnus credits his WCU experience as the foundation for a life of purpose.

This spring, Brian Zepka '13 will graduate with his doctoral degree in Public and Environmental Health, adding "doctor" to his growing list of credentials: environmental scientist, public health advocate, and published young adult author. Each of these accomplishments stems from one transformational experience, according to Zepka: four years as a West Chester University student.

"I think of my time at WCU as the starting point of my professional life," says Zepka. "It was a foundational experience—a time of discovery and maturation, when I found confidence in myself, and the starting point for both my writing and public health career."

Zepka entered the University on a pre-medicine track but discovered his passion for the public health side of disease prevention through his coursework, quickly realizing his interests fell less in clinical medicine and more in areas like environmental science and epidemiology. Along the way, he discovered an unexpected talent.



"As a student, my coursework was intense, so I started writing for fun," says Zepka, whose fiction works focus on LGBTQ themes, coming-of-age stories, and sci-fi, among other topics.

At WCU, Zepka learned by doing, immersing himself in experiential learning opportunities like shadowing healthcare professionals and volunteering at Chester County Hospital as an emergency room technician. His coursework also took him beyond the classroom to places like Natural Lands' Stroud Preserve, where he and classmates studied grasslands, farmlands, and woodlands.

"Experiences like these validated my desire to pursue a path that was less clinical and more community focused," recalls Zepka, who went on to work for organizations like the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and World Resources Institute.

"The courses I took, the people I met—it all opened my eyes to new opportunities and perspectives," he says. "It showed me, firsthand, what kind of impact your work can have on the world."

A Daughter's Dream, A Family's Mission

Inspired by their child's educational journey, the Dash family is paying it forward, breaking down barriers for future teachers.

When Deborah and Rob Dash's daughter, Samantha Dash '22, headed off to West Chester University to pursue a degree in education, she was following in the footsteps of both parents: her father, a West Chester alumnus, and her mother, a lifelong educator.

For the Dashes, seeing Samantha thrive at WCU presented a unique opportunity to ensure even more aspiring educators could follow the same path.

"Seeing our daughter's educational journey and the steps she progressed in following her passion to become a teacher helped solidify what we wanted to do in helping others—a new generation of youth coming through," says Rob.

Inspired by the vision of Dean Desha Williams, the Dashes jumped at the chance to support the PRIZE Program, an initiative designed to address the national teacher pipeline shortage. The program, a partnership between WCU and participating regional school districts, cultivates exceptional educators who, following their graduation from WCU, agree to return to PRIZE school districts to teach.

"I believe all students deserve a chance for an education," says Deborah. "So often the quality of education is tied to the wealth—or lack of wealth—in a community. If we can put more quality educators into low-income districts, the opportunities for impact are boundless."

For the Dashes, the mission of the PRIZE Program directly aligns with philanthropic priorities that have long been close to their hearts.

"All of our charitable endeavors focus on children, because children don't choose where they originate from, but every child should have the opportunity to better themselves, provided they put the effort in," says Rob.

"Choosing West Chester University as a beneficiary allows us, through this program, to achieve our goals: allowing those who may not otherwise be able to achieve their dreams to have that opportunity."

Preserving Beauty, Cultivating Knowledge

A historic land partnership protects one of the region's most breathtaking greenways while generating millions for student opportunities.

It all began with one donor's vision: preserve her beloved 52-acre Chester County farm property, Ridley Springs, while investing in West Chester University's future. Championed by former WCU Foundation Board Chair John Baker '74, that vision became an innovative two-year partnership involving the Foundation; West Chester University; East Whiteland Township; and state, county, and local funding partners.

Following the donation of the farm to the Foundation, the Township purchased the \$4.7 million property for preservation as protected open space, directing proceeds as discretionary funding to the University. This flexible funding stream—available at the University's discretion—will support student success initiatives including scholarships and experiential learning.

"This partnership represents the best of philanthropic vision coming to life," says Deb Cornelius '91, Executive Director of the WCU Foundation. "Our donor wanted to preserve her farm while supporting our students, and through creative collaboration, we've honored both wishes while generating transformational, unrestricted funding."

The outcome is a true win-win-win: a donor's vision honored, the University strengthened with significant funding, and the community enriched with preserved open space. Even better, the land itself will remain a vibrant part of WCU's story. Students—especially those in geographic information systems, health, sustainability, art and design, and the sciences—will use the property as a living laboratory, applying what they learn in class to hands-on projects that benefit both the campus and the wider community.

"This partnership gives West Chester University an extraordinary resource that will expand opportunities for experiential learning and applied research," says Evan Leach, PhD, Dean of the College of Business and Public Management. "Students apply classroom knowledge to real-world projects, developing skills and confidence for professional success."

"Our commitment to sustain this land is part of who we are as good stewards," adds President Laurie Bernotsky. "This beautifully demonstrates how the University contributes to environmental sustainability while integrating students in everything we do."

From Service to Scholarship

Patricia “Pat” M. Inglesby ’76 has lived through some of history’s greatest health challenges, experiences that now fuel her mission to support tomorrow’s healthcare heroes.

To say that Pat Inglesby’s nursing career has placed her at the frontlines of an evolving healthcare landscape would be an understatement.

After graduating with her bachelor’s degree in Nursing from West Chester University, one of Inglesby’s first positions placed her in an intensive care unit, where she encountered both patients suffering from AIDS—a disease that would change the course of humanity—as well as Legionnaires’ disease following the deadly Philadelphia-based outbreak in the late 1970s. Decades later, in her 60s, found herself yet again in the trenches of another unfamiliar virus, nursing amid the COVID-19 pandemic, and eventually traveling on a medical mission to Warsaw, Poland, to aid Ukrainian refugees at age 70.

“I’m an average person who found themselves in extraordinary circumstances,” Inglesby recalls. “If I hadn’t gone to West Chester University and didn’t have those basic principles on which to build, I don’t know how successful I could have been.”

Inspired by her mother, who received her nursing diploma from Frankford Nursing School in Philadelphia—and would later earn her bachelor’s degree from WCU in 1972—Inglesby’s career transported her to a variety of healthcare settings, from the ICU to ophthalmology to managing a vascular lab, a move that would springboard her into clinical research at Wyeth, which later became Pfizer.



“When you love what you do, you don’t work a day in your life, and that’s me—I loved what I did,” Inglesby recalls fondly. “I don’t think I would have had any of these opportunities had I not had a great education to build from.”

In recognition of this experience, and as a way to honor both of her parents and the value they placed on education, in 2015, Inglesby established the Mr. and Mrs. Edward and Mary Macko Endowment to provide scholarships to a new generation of aspiring nurses.

“It’s a privilege to get an education, but education is a lot of work, and it’s more expensive now than ever,” she says. “Students should have time to study, to replenish. My hope is that these funds will help more students do just that.”

A Lifelong Melody

Through an estate gift to the Wells School of Music, Robert "Bob" Rhoades '64 is ensuring future generations can discover the transformative power of music education.

Bob Rhoades' childhood took him across the country—from the city streets of New Orleans to the quiet countryside of Lansdale, Pennsylvania. But one constant remained, regardless of where he called home: his love of music.

At just nine years old, Rhoades learned to play clarinet in New Orleans, widely considered the birthplace of jazz. When his family relocated to Pennsylvania, he continued honing his musical talents in high school under the guidance of his music teacher, a West Chester University alumnus who inspired Rhoades to follow the same path.

"Music teaches you how to perform, but more importantly, it teaches you how to achieve something," recalls Rhoades, who went on to enjoy a 32-year career as a music educator.

"Music reinforces the notion that we all have to learn to practice," he adds. "That lesson of practice and dedication, one that grew while I was attending West Chester University, I've used every day of my life—it's certainly paid off."

Now, through an estate gift benefiting the Wells School of Music, Rhoades is helping create new opportunities for future musicians and music educators to pair their passion for music with their desire to bring positive change to the world, just as he did.

His gift—supporting faculty needs, student scholarships, and immersive student experiences—is more than a tribute to his own musical journey. It's also a way to honor his late wives, both of whom played instruments.

"We need educated people in all areas," Rhoades says. "Since I don't have a family any longer, I thought the best thing to do with my estate was give it to a place I knew something about, a place that would do something worthwhile with it—and I have no doubt that will happen here at WCU."

Coming Home

After 40 years in business leadership, one alumnus returns to strengthen the University that launched his success.

It's been more than 40 years since Thomas E. Mills, IV '81 left West Chester University with his accounting degree in hand, but he remembers one thing with perfect clarity.

"I lacked nothing with regard to my technical ability and my accounting knowledge," Mills recalls proudly. "Because of the work ethic that I saw modeled by everyone around me at WCU, it didn't feel like an adjustment for me."

After graduation, Mills joined one of the "Big Eight" accounting firms, KPMG, where he quickly saw how his WCU education stacked up against his peers—a confidence he carried into various leadership roles throughout his business career.

Years later, Mills returned to his roots, joining then-Dean of the College of Business and Public Management, Dr. Christopher Fiorentino, as a member of the school's Business Advisory Council.

"As a student, I found that WCU provided a unique combination: low cost and high-quality business education, something I still see today," says Mills. "It's why I have such a special place in my heart for this University—one that called me back all these years later."

Today, Mills serves as Vice President of the West Chester University Foundation Board of Trustees, playing a vital role in preserving the defining qualities that continue to set WCU apart. In addition to his board leadership, Mills and his wife, Lorie, are generous philanthropic partners, supporting the construction of a new home for the College of Business and
